Many of you probably experience the same emotions when championships end as my teammates and I did this year in Paris. We were so enthusiastic about our sports and our community that we could hardly wait to get back home and promote IGLA within our team. We were left wishing that this feeling could be sustained or augmented more throughout the year. Well, the long promised IGLA Series Meets are getting closer to reality and that euphoria can be more than a once a year sensation.

After a year of working out the details of what an IGLA meet is and should be, the committee developed guidelines that were approved by the Board in April, to be distributed to all of the IGLA teams. Now the application form to be the host of one of the inaugural meets is in the hands of the board and will soon be sent to your home team. What does this mean to you and your team? Many teams already have established meets that certainly fit the criteria that the committee agreed upon, meets that reflect their locales and communities and take advantage of facilities and resources to highlight the home team. These teams are invited to make application to have these meets become IGLA Series Meets with a wider promotion of the event and that cachet that we hope the Series Meets hold.

But there are also many teams out there that have never hosted a meet, whose cities offer exciting venues to our community, that may need just this extra incentive to bid for and hold a Series Meet. Included with the application form will be the Series Meet guidelines and also a document that has invaluable information about holding a meet, any meet. Timelines, projected expenses, sponsorship suggestions and a host of other information is included to ease worries and make hosting an IGLA meet as attractive and fun as possible. Here is a chance to showcase your team and your city. Encourage your team leaders to act on the application form and have your city be one of the first cities to host an IGLA Series Meet. We would love to visit your city and meet your team.

Getting Women in the Water

For years the IGLA board and individual teams have been asking the same question, "How can we recruit more women?" Well with an initiate being spear headed by the Women's Development Committee there may just be a light at the end of the tunnel. Morri Spang, the choreographer of West Hollywood's Championship Paris Poodle routine, is working on a project to raise money for breast cancer research AND to **recruit women**. Here's a thumbnail sketch that Morri has come up with:

"What I proposed to WH2O's Board was that we would be the agents for raising funds for the Gay and Lesbian Community Services Center's Audre Lourde Health Center, through a "Swim and Wade for the Cure" event. The Center has a huge mailing list, and if they were willing to front the monies for printing flyers, sign-up sheets, and sponsor sheets. WH2O would arrange for the pool, lifeguards, deck music, snacks, and enthusiasm. The WH2O's Board was all for it.

The Center's Development people are, of course, gung ho about the idea of some other group raising money for them. They are deciding if they need to protect the confidentiality of their mailing list by having ONLY their people stuff envelopes, or if they'd like us to help.

A project to raise money for breast cancer AND to recruit women!

What the Center gets is 100% of the money raised in exchange for 99% of the money spent. WH2O gets the opportunity to do some great community service work and ferret out some women swimmers who might not have otherwise shown themselves. My thinking is that there are lots of women who feel totally confident about their swimming abilities when asked to use them for a good, woman-centered cause; these same women might not answer a recruitment drive for a competitive team (that old "Am I good enough?" fear).

I'll be happy to keep all teams posted on our progress, and will be glad to share what documents we use, etc., etc."

What a great idea Morri! IGLA would like to wish WH2O and the Women's Development Committee much luck!

IGLA's Activities Continue to Expand

After the IGLA Championships in Paris, it became evident that Synchronized Swimming had acquired a total right of citizenship as an "IGLA sport". The Synchro competition at IP2K was well attended participation-wise, the audience was numerous and supported the artistic efforts of the athletes enthusiastically. IGLA would like to build on the momentum created by the IP2K Championship and foster this sport.

During the last telephone conference, your Board contacted the Toronto IGLA 2001 organizers to discuss the inclusion of this sport (which was not planned at the time of awarding of the bid) in the IGLA 2001 program. Toronto will get back to us with their analysis by the end of August.

The major step will be to make sure that synchronized swimming will have some sort of visibility at the next Gay Games, to be held in Sydney in November 2002. It should be clarified that the contract between Sydney 2002 (S2002) and the Federation of Gay Games was signed two years ago and that, according to this contract, S2002 has no contractual obligation to add any sport to the program that has already been settled and approved by the Federation.

I have however been in touch since April with S2002 Sport Coordinator Stuart Borrie

and Swimming Chair Bob McInnes (who participated in IP2K). We have exchanged several e-mails on this matters, as well as some phone calls. Bob and I have also met in person in Paris in mid-July. As always, Stuart and Bob showed a great deal of openness and availability in listening to and understanding our concerns. And they left us with a promise to look into various possibilities. Frank Lahanque, the new IGLA Synchro chair, has drafted a useful document containing some guidelines for the organization if a synchro swimming competition. While this document still needs work and IGLA's official approval, it can be useful both for the Toronto and the Sydney organizers to evaluate the resources as long as facilities and volunteers are concerned. Financially, an important element of this analysis is that synchro is an artistically appealing event, therefore it can be ticketed for the audience and wind up paying for itself or even generating profit for the host.

IGLA swimmer Brad Levinson has raised similar concerns about the inclusion of Open Water Swimming in the GGVI program. Stuart Borrie is now aware of these concerns as well, and he is looking into possible solutions to make sure that IGLA long distance swim-

Championship Committee Report

The Championship Rules Committee has been hard at work since the meet in Paris. We are in the process of completing all of the follow-up documentation begun there. The amendments to the *Rules and Recommendations for IGLA Championships and Gay Games Aquatics Competitions* approved in Paris have been added to the handbook and the new edition should be available from the IGLA website shortly. We will be submitting the updated version to the Federation of Gay Games at the annual meeting this fall in Sydney.

In addition, we have been working on the evaluations of the championships in Paris. The *IGLA Representative's Post-meet Evaluations* have been compiled and the summary is complete. The Performance Bond Committee is still working on its evaluation to help

determine the portion of the performance bond that will be refunded to Paris Aquatique.

Work on changes and amendments to the R&R has just begun. The committee agenda has been planned so that these proposed changes will be sent to the general membership one month prior to the 2001 championships in Toronto.

We look forward to working with the bid committees for the 2003 championships and hope your team is considering hosting the IGLA Championships. If you need more information on bidding for the championships or if you wish to participate as a member of this committee, you should contact one of the committee co-chairs so your name can be added to the committee list.

Annette Bernier IGLA Pacific Co-Chair

I started my swimming "career" at age 8 in Miami, Florida. At that time US Swimming was known as AAU. The first few years were tough, but then I learned key swimming 'secrets' like how to rest on the wall with a cramp, how to turn in the middle of the pool to catch up. It is largely due to the support of my fellow team members that I have learned to become proud of my sexuality and dedicated to promoting gay and lesbian aquatics. In 1994 I attended my first gay and lesbian aquatic competition at the Gay Games in New York. Then in 1997, I experienced the feeling of being a meet coordinator by helping organize the 10th Anniversary of IGLA, in San Diego. Lastly, at Paris 2000, I was accorded the position of IGLA Pacific Co-Chair. My main focus in the year to come will be on Women's Development, Water Polo, and Diving. On a personal note, I live with my partner, a Paris 2000 Water Polo "Ouest le trophée?" team member, Kim Theriault, and own my own website design and consulting company.

Ivan Bussens IGLA Atlantic Co-Chair

I joined Out to Swim in 1994, never having done much sport before. That year I was part of a small team

of 40 at the Games in New York. My first meet - very interesting! I was born and brought up in Malaysia and now live in very urban industrial surroundings in Central London, with Peter, my partner of 19 years. He's an accountant and I'm a designer of architectural interiors. Outside the pool, I've the usual interests: enjoying movies, nice food, messing about with motor bikes, the occasional visit to galleries, weekends in the country - that sort of thing. I've just had my 40th birthday.

I enjoy organizing things for Out to Swim. The teamwork environment suits me, and presently I'm guiding our volunteers with our own novice meet. This will be part of the "UK Gay Sports 2000" event, organized by the London Borough of Waltham Forest over the weekend of 29 July 2000.
